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FROM MY HEART TO YOURS

Dear Friends,

At the recent inauguration banquet of Olivet College's new President, Dr. Steven Corey, I sat at a table with the new interim superintendent of Olivet Schools and a county commissioner. The superintendent (newly-appointed) told of staff cuts in the schools. The commissioner told a gripping story about the previous night's commissioners meeting where 18 jobs were cut from the county's staff, one of those people had 23 years of service to the county. He was sad and disappointed in the conditions that made this necessary.

In the September 15th edition of USA Today, a front-page headline reads "GOAL IS TO FIX PUBLIC TRUST AND FINANCES." It was followed by an interview with the federal deficit panel leaders.

Our Association shares in some of the dynamics of all three of these situations. What we hear from our own "public" is the need to work on three goals – get closer to our churches, invest in those efforts that will engender trust and viability in the work of our wider fellowship, and reduce our Association's deficit.

The stress and heartache of achieving this last goal is something, without a doubt, staff and leaders of our Association feel. Emotions run from disappointment, to anxiety, to hope, to commitment, to the tasks at hand and an increased dependence on God to guide our path.

As I write this (September 19), Bill Rafuse in his daily prayer request on Facebook, suggested:

Pray that the Transition Team be used of God to form a vessel God can use to make our churches effective in preaching and teaching the Gospel to the world around us, a vessel that helps us to be ministers of encouragement to each other, and may our churches and people desire the Spirit to do both.

Jill Hudson in a recent article I have quoted to you before wrote: "The Church and life is in flux...we either brace ourselves against change or embrace the opportunities change provides. (*"When Better Is Not Enough"*).

The Congregational Way is not a museum, it is a movement. I for one am praying as Bill suggested, with great hope that God's truth has yet more light to shed upon us.

The Center for Congregational Leadership continues to develop its programs and services on behalf of our member churches. The Center followed up on its Web Savvy Ministry seminar (March 2008) with a one day Technology and Worship Seminar, held September 24th and led by Doug Gray.

The Arvel M. and Kathleen Steece Religious Library which moved to the Center last January has been sorted and is being catalogued. Many of the volumes will be circulated. Others will be available at the Center or upon special request of researchers and scholars. We expect to have the collection fully available by Spring of 2012.

The partnership with Olivet College continues to grow and is blossoming with the support and encouragement of Olivet College's new president, Dr. Steven Corey. The college has access to three ordained NACCC clergy, Rev. Jack Brown, Rev. Mike Fales and Rev. Dr. Betsey Mauro. All three serve on the faculty in support of the religious studies program.

CFTS students from Maine, Wisconsin, Michigan, New York, Kansas and California gathered for their annual Fall Seminar, exploring multiple aspects of Congregational Worship. Preparing for Congregational ministry, they not only enhanced their knowledge but also enjoyed deeply connected fellowship with one another. Instructors for the Fall Seminar included Rev. Dr. Donn Ed, pastor of First Congregational Church of Etna in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Rev. Mimi Biedron of North Congregational Church in Farmington Hills, Michigan and Rev. Doug Gray, pastor of Second Congregational Church in Beloit, Wisconsin. Thank you to faculty and participants alike!

This past July, a History and Polity course was held in Boston (aka, the "Boston Seminar"). A requirement for our CFTS students, it is also open to others who want to know more about Congregationalism. A total of 20 people gathered, 5 of whom were students, three were faculty and 12 were clergy and laity. Many of the clergy serve NACCC member churches but come from another tradition. Congratulations to them and the churches they serve for gaining the skills and knowledge to help them be the best *Congregational* pastors they can be.

Recent staffing changes at the NACCC have resulted in an increase of hours for the Center's Administrative Assistant, Marie Steele. We are blessed by Marie's competence and dedication and look forward to the strides we can make with her added efforts.

Please continue to pray for the work of our Association. We at the Center look forward to continuing to serve you in the best ways we are able. Thank you for your support and encouragement in all that we do.

The Executive Committee has reaffirmed Thanksgiving Sunday as Heritage Sunday throughout the Association.


Churches will receive packets including suggested liturgy and historical notes celebrating our Congregational heritage.

A MOMENT IN HISTORY

The World's Most Famous Sermon

Did you know that the world's most famous sermon was written by a Congregationalist? But how many of us would return the next week after being blasted with words like these?

“Yea, God is a great deal more angry with great numbers that are now on earth: yea, doubtless, with many that are now in this congregation, who it may be are at ease, than he is with many of those who are now in the flames of hell. . . . [N]atural men are held in the hand of God, over the pit of hell; they have deserved the fiery pit, and are already sentenced to it; and God is dreadfully provoked, his anger is as great towards them as to those that are actually suffering the executions of the fierceness of his wrath in hell, and they have done nothing in the least to appease or abate that anger, neither is God in the least bound by any promise to hold them up one moment; the devil is waiting for them, hell is gaping for them, the flames gather and flash about them, and would fain lay hold on them, and swallow them up; the fire pent up in their own hearts is struggling to break out: and they have no interest in any Mediator, there are no means within reach that can be any security to them.”

And this for the children’s sermon:

“And you, children, who are unconverted, do not you know that you are going down to hell, to bear the dreadful wrath of that God, who is now angry with you every day and every night?”

Yet in 1741, when “Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God” was first preached, it was met with enthusiasm and quickly spread throughout the English-speaking world. Its author, Jonathon Edwards (1703-1758), the Billy Graham of his day, provided the intellectual underpinnings for the “First Great Awakening”, a wave of revivals that swept America, England, and Scotland. He inspired other key figures, such as John Wesley, George Whitefield, and Gilbert Tennet. He led the “New Light” Congregationalists, who championed a more heartfelt religion, against the traditionalist “Old Lights”, who were doubtful of “enthusiasm.” As an intellectual he was rivaled only by Benjamin Franklin and wrote appreciatively yet critically of the ideas of Sir Isaac Newton, John Locke, Francis Hutcheson. All the while, he served as pastor of one of New England's largest churches, then superintendent of an Indian mission, and finally president of Princeton College.

By its very topic - an angry, really angry God - “Sinners” is off-putting to modern ears. In the eighteenth century, however, people expected sermons to treat such thing as the terrors of hell, the wrath of God, and the wickedness of the human heart. What distinguished Edward's sermon was not what he said but how he said it – saving words piled on and hammered in with one powerful metaphor after another.

So please do not quickly dismiss Edwards because of this sermon (it is often the first and only thing people ever read!). The same author could write tenderly: “Don’t, however, consume too much of your time and strength in poring and puzzling thoughts about old experiences. . . . Rather, apply yourself with all your might to an earnest pursuit after renewed experiences, new light, and new, lively acts of faith and love.” Even “sinners” was intended as a word of grace – a loving God was holding back richly deserved punishment, offering hope of repentance and renewal.

And while burning with anger is not our first thought of God, doesn't it seem that after creating the world out of love, God must be saddened by all the harm we do to ourselves and each other? I think that was what Edwards was really trying to get at.
