Whatever your congregation's particular style of singing carols, I hope that both the uplifting words of the familiar songs, as well as the new interpretations of them, create an atmosphere of hospitality to all who come to celebrate this blessed season with you. It is all about lifting our voices in praise of Emmanuel.


